



## What is palliative care?





### Palliative Care...

- · Is available at any stage of illness
- Can support caregivers and families as well as patients
- · Is about improving quality of life

### Palliative Care vs. Hospice

#### **Palliative Care**

- Aggressive pain, symptom, and quality of life management
- Care philosophy centers on a team approach that includes the patient and family

#### Hospice

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### Palliative Care vs. Hospice


#### **Palliative Care**

- Patient has a serious, life-limiting illness
- Patient may be seeking curative treatments and return to the hospital

### Hospice

- Patient has an untreatable illness with expected lifespan in the order of months or less
- Patient is not seeking curative measures nor return to hospital

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### Palliative Care in Multiple Myeloma

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### Palliative Care in Multiple Myeloma

- Often see patients at diagnosis
  - o If complicated presentation with severe symptoms
- Novel treatments have improved length of life
  - o Can increase symptom burden from disease and treatments
- · Improves quality of life

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# Common Symptom Issues in Multiple Myeloma

- Bone pain
  - o Palliative radiotherapy
  - o Palliative procedures, e.g. vertebroplasty
  - o Palliative surgeries
  - o Analgesics
- Fatigue
  - Side effect of chemotherapy
  - o Post-bone marrow transplant
  - o Anemia

# Common Symptom Issues in Multiple Myeloma

- Depression / anxiety
  - o Fear and uncertainty; stress; loneliness
  - o Hope and adjustment
- Side effects of therapies
  - o Peripheral neuropathy
  - o Infections

### Your Palliative Care Team

- Family physician or primary oncologist manages initial symptom management and supportive care
- Oncologists have training in basic palliative care
- Family physicians have higher level training in palliative care and have long-term relationships with their patients

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# Your Palliative Care Team (in Victoria)

- If complex, may refer to a specialized Palliative Care Team:
  - In hospital → palliative care physician and nurse consult team
  - In community and able to get out to clinic → BC Cancer Pain & Symptom / Palliative Care Clinic (physician, nurse, pharmacist team)
  - In community and unable to leave home → Victoria
    Hospice palliative physician and/or Palliative Response
    Team (advanced practice palliative nurse and
    counsellor)

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### Community Health Services (Home Nursing)

- Connection with one primary home care nurse
- May include community health workers (care aides), OT, PT, dietician, social work
- May include checking in by phone, but may also include home visits

### Community Health Services

- Victoria Community Access Centre (for South Island):
  - All communities south of Mill Bay, including Greater Victoria, the Southern Gulf Islands and west to Port Renfrew.

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Victoria Hospice

- A community program (charity) in the Victoria area, providing end-of-life care in a variety of settings, including patient homes, inpatient unit, and in consultation in other health care facilities.
- Registration with Victoria Hospice allows access to services
  - o Palliative Response Team, counsellors, volunteers, respite program, bereavement follow-up for families, etc.


### Victoria Hospice

- Registration is done through Community Health Services, and begins with a referral from your family physician, oncologist, or another health care provider.
- · Criteria:
  - o Diagnosed with life-threatening illness.
  - o Live in Victoria Hospice region of service.
  - Goal of care is palliative and comfort-oriented, rather than focused on cure.
  - o Reside in own home or assisted-living.



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### Advance Care Planning Basics

- Conversations with family, friends and health care providers about your beliefs, values, and wishes
- May include writing these down, or naming a specific person to make decisions

### **Options**

- Standard Representation Agreement: Section 7
- Enhanced Representation Agreement: Section 9
- Advance Directive
- Enduring Power of Attorney
